I am very excited to announce that UUS:E has been invited to develop a partnership with Manchester's Verplanck Elementary School. Members of UUS:E's Social Justice / Anti-Oppression Committee and I have assessed our capacity to participate in such a partnership. After meeting with a staff person from the school's Family Resource Center, we feel we definitely have the capacity. Further, this is a great opportunity in **UUS:E's 50th anniversary year** to make a new commitment to the Manchester community. The partnership will support low income children and their families, many of whom are immigrants. Support includes a holiday gift drive, preparation of Thanksgiving baskets, mentoring, homework help, etc. We can start slowly and adapt to needs in the school community as they emerge. Your dedication to our children and youth is truly a gift to our community. You are all a blessing!

During the months of July and August UUS:E shifts to summer mode, offering just one service at 10 AM. RE programming is held concurrently. Our summer RE program's focus is fun and community. The summer provides an excellent opportunity for children to be with their UUS:E peers, deepening their connections with one another and having fun together. It's also a great way for children and adult volunteers to interact and learn from one another.

Each Sunday morning throughout the summer will feature a different activity, many of which are planned and facilitated by members of the RE Committee and other volunteers. 
UU Ministry for Earth, UUA Green Sanctuary Program, and UU-United Nations Office have joined to form Create Climate Justice Net.

Partnering With A Manchester Elementary School

This fall, UUS:E will be starting on a “faith-community partnership” with Verplanck Elementary, a large and diverse school in Manchester. Verplanck is officially a “high need” school where the majority of children are eligible for free and reduced-price lunch.

We think this is a great opportunity to connect in a very substantive way with low-income families in Manchester. As a partner, we may collect school supplies, Thanksgiving food or holiday gifts. Volunteers can “mentor” individual students during the lunch hour, or help with reading, math and research skills.

Beyond that, it appears that we can start slowly and go at our own pace in terms of building the relationship. Over time, we can work with the staff and PTA on evening events or weekend projects (bike rodeo, playground clean-up, garden planting, Fun Run etc.)

Fifteen UUSEasters have already said they are interested, and we held our first meeting with the Family Resource Center Coordinator. Facility Copyright License

UUS:E has purchased a bundled facility copyright license from Christian Copyright Solutions (CCS), which permits us to legally perform, have performed or broadcast through speakers music that is subject to a copyright. This is a one-year bundled license covering any music copyrighted through ASCAP, BMI and SESAC, which accounts for well over 99% of all music copyrights issued. CCS will distribute a portion of our license fee to each of the foregoing entities. Additional fees will be owed if we charge set ticket prices at events (as opposed to “by donation only”). Although music performed or played in the sanctuary during an actual religious service is exempt from licensing, any music performed in rooms other than the sanctuary and outside of the main service requires a license. This license will cover music played or broadcasted at social events, in the program room before/after services, at Yoga, concerts, etc. Note that the license does NOT cover streaming or Internet distribution of music. This means that music should NOT be placed on our Internet or other public sites (Facebook, website, etc.). This includes recordings we make at UUS:E, YouTube, or links embedded in other sites. Although a streaming license is available for purchase, it would have been significantly more expensive than just the facility license. Also note that while older music (composed by long-dead composers) is in the public domain and not subject to copyright, a derivative version (arrangement) of that music is frequently copyrighted, so it’s best just to assume that music cannot be streamed or linked on the Internet unless the actual composer posts or gives written permission to post or link the music


